For instance, the wife included compliments, help cleaning, and eating a weekly meal together. The husband then got to look over the list and pick one thing to "give" her each week from her list. He, in turn, wrote his list and she picked one thing a week to "give" to him.

One of the most important things we decided upon was that each one committed to doing one thing on the list, <u>regardless</u> of the other fulfilling their end of the bargain. This was so difficult because in our human weakness, we get caught up in giving with the expectation of getting. We must remember, however, that God calls us to be giving first and foremost. "It is more blessed to give than to receive." (Acts 20:35)

And so I challenge you to keep this saying in your heart. When you are questioning what God or others have done for you lately, turn it around, pray about what God is calling you to do, and "Ask not what your _____ can do for you, but what can you do for them."

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
